NEWS

Playground Area Renovation Committee (PARC)

The marina renovation was a huge success for BBCA and now that the loan is close to being paid-off we are researching a new project. Most concerns from residents we hear are in connection to the beach/playground area and I am very excited to announce the creation of a committee to renovate our playground area. The committee will investigate the following: replacement of the beach parking area gate, the playground equipment, picnic tables and benches. Additionally, the committee will look into the possibility of building a small pavilion. The committee is being formed to evaluate vendors, garner permits, obtain financing/estimates/proposals, etc. We will discuss the playground area renovations at the next town meeting and I encourage feedback from the community. We have a group of 7 volunteers for this project and we will be meeting on **Thursday, Sept. 29th at the beach @ 7pm.** Please consider

volunteering for this project; this is a great opportunity to serve the community and improve our neighborhood for years to come.

Generator Safety Tips

The Insurance Institute for Business & Home Safety (IBHS) has offered the following generator safety tips to the thousands of people who remain without power in our area. Power outages mean many will be using generators, which pose certain risks. These risks include fire, damage to electrical equipment, and even injury or death. Safe operation is the key to avoiding these dangers.

The following guidelines from IBHS are essential to the safe use of a generator:

Proper ventilation is critical to reducing the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning from a gasoline-powered generator's engine exhaust. Carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning is a common, serious danger that can cause death if generators are used improperly; this is particularly true when the fuel is not burned completely. Never use generators indoors or outside near windows, vents, or air intakes that could allow CO to come indoors.

Maintain plenty of air flow space around the generator.

Get fresh air immediately if you begin to feel flu like symptoms, sick, dizzy or light-headed. Because CO is invisible and odorless, if possible, business and/or building owners should get and use a CO detector to warn of rising CO levels.

Carefully follow all instructions on properly "grounding" the generator. Keep the generator dry. If needed, place the generator under an open canopy type structure. Short circuits may occur in wet conditions; this can cause a generator fire.

When it comes to generator fuel, store fuel in an approved container or holding tank designed for such use;

only use fuel that is specifically recommended in the owner's manual; never store fuel indoors; do not keep fuel near the generator while the generator is in use – this could start a fire; never refuel the generator while it is running; and, always keep a fully charged fire extinguisher nearby. To avoid electric shock or electrocution, do not try to fix or otherwise work on a generator without following standard lock out, tag out procedures prescribed by the Occupational Safety & Health Administration (OSHA) to ensure that the generator power supply is off and may not be accidentally turned on.

Keep cords out of the way to avoid injury, but also keep cords in plain view to keep track of cord damage (such as fraying or cuts) that could cause a fire.

Do not "back feed" power into your electrical system by plugging the generator into a wall outlet.

Back feeding will put you and others, including utility line workers, at serious risk because the utility transformer can increase low voltage from the generator to thousands of volts.

Some states have laws making the generator owner responsible for taking steps to make sure that the generator's electricity cannot feed back into power lines; also, owners of commercial, industrial, or residential generator must notify the local utility of their locations.

The exterior portions of a generator, even if operated for only a short period of time, can become hot. Avoid touching the generator without protective gear and keep debris clear to avoid a fire.

Tall Grass – Route 214 versus Personal Property

Rt. 214

As we drive down Rt. 214/Beverly Ave. into our community it is becoming increasingly apparent that grass is becoming quite tall and unattractive along the sides of the street. Since most of these homes sit along Rt. 214 part of the lawn cutting is handled by the State Highway Administration (SHA). However, the SHA offices and routine operations are being curtailed due to budget reductions. These services may or may not happen on a regular basis! Although it appears that most of the grass has recently been cut, please help keep Beverly Beach beautiful before the grass gets tall again; consider cutting the grass if you can, safely, or contact the SHA and submit a request on-line to have someone come out to cut the grass (please remember it could be weeks before they are able to come out!)

Personal Property

However, property owners are responsible for ensuring their lawns are routinely cut. If the grass becomes taller than 12" you can contact the Bureau of Highways, Southern District to become involved. If a property owner is in violation of code (Article 13, Title 6) notification will be sent to the property owner via certified letter and the owner is given 7 days to comply. If they do not comply by the 8th day, the County's contractor is sent to cut the property and the property owner is invoiced. Gunfire and Illegal Hunting on Beverly-Triton Beach Park

This issue continues to be an concern. Please report anything suspicious immediately! In the past it has been reported that illegal deer hunting was a chronic, ongoing problem on Beverly-Triton Beach Park property presenting a safety issue to residents residing near park property and anyone walking on park property. Please report gunfire, illegal hunting or other illegal activity to the Maryland Department of Natural Resources Police at 1-800-628-9944, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Please be reminded that deer hunting on Beverly-Triton Beach Park property is illegal and weapons of any kind are also illegal on Beverly-Triton

Beach Park. DNR Police ask that you call providing as much information as possible such as time of day, the direction gun shots were heard coming from, or any other information that may be useful in identifying the perpetrators. If a vehicle is seen, please attempt to get its tag number, make, model and color.

Power Outages and Food!

If the power is out for less than 4 hours, then the food in your refrigerator and freezer will be safe to consume. While the power is out, keep the refrigerator and freezer doors closed as much as possible to keep food cold for longer.

If the power is out for longer than 4 hours, follow the guidelines below:

1. **For the Freezer section:** A freezer that is half full will hold food safely for up to 24 hours. A full freezer will hold food safely for 48 hours. Do not open the freezer door if you can avoid it.
2. **For the Refrigerated section:** Pack milk, other dairy products, meat, fish, eggs, gravy, and spoilable leftovers into a cooler surrounded by ice. Inexpensive Styrofoam coolers are fine for this purpose.
3. Use a digital quick-response thermometer to check the temperature of your food right before you cook or eat it. Throw away any food that has a temperature of more than 40 degrees Fahrenheit.

INVITATION TO ATTEND COMMUNITY MEETING
DEER MANAGEMENT
AT BEVERLY-TRITON BEACH PARK

Dear Resident,

The Anne Arundel County Recreation and Parks Department is considering the implementation of a deer reduction strategy at Beverly-Triton Beach Park. When the population of deer exceeds the carrying capacity of the surrounding habitat, it affects forest regeneration, natural succession and biological diversity. It also can impact public health by spreading deer ticks which can carry Lyme disease and public safety by increasing serious vehicle collisions. The Department does not view population control as a recreational program, but as a management tool that can be enacted in areas where the deer population is having such impacts.

A Community meeting has been scheduled to discuss the specific deer management plan being considered for your area and we invite you to attend this meeting. The meeting information is below:
